

- 2. More affordable and available high-quality child care is needed.
- 3. Nebraskans believe the state should invest more in early care and education.
- 4. Nebraskans voice strong support for children in greatest need.

- 3. What are Nebraska parents' views about investment in early care and education?



Child Care Options



When families cannot care for their child(ren) in their own home during all or part of the day, which of the following care settings do you think is the best option for most families?

- 50% early care and education center
- 16% home-based child care setting
- 32% family member
- 2% friend or neighbor

Parent Report Takeaways



- Nebraska parents report a need for early care and education programs.
- 2. Nebraska parents believe the early care and education their own child receives is good or excellent but are concerned about the cost as well as the quality of care available to all children in the city or area in which they live.
- 3. Nebraskans with children and without children want greater investment in early care and education.
