Nebraska Facts & Figures

- First in nation for percentage of labor force participation with single mothers with children under 6
- 2nd in nation for percentage of married couple families with both spouses in labor force
- 2nd in nation for share of families in poverty with a householder or spouse who worked full-time and year-round
- 5th highest birth rate in nation



Early Childhood is a Business Issue



- Annual State Chamber of Commerce surveys routinely cite workforce shortages as the primary challenge to employers
- Employers need employees who possess:
 - Job-relevant technical knowledge
 - Fundamental character, critical thinking and self-regulation skills
- High-quality early learning opportunities create a more flexible, responsive future talent pool to meet the needs of emerging technologies and industries
- Employers report nearly 58,000 vacant jobs in Nebraska
- Child care costs the U.S. 57 billion in lost earnings, productivity and revenue ("Want to Grow," 2019)

Policies for Healthy, Happy Employees

- Offer flexible work arrangements (telecommuting, flextime, etc.)
- Employee Assistance Program (EAP)
- Employee Wellness Program
- Flexible Spending Account (FSA)
- Private spaces for breastfeeding
- Backup care options or subsidize child care



Be a Champion for Early Childhood



- Educate leadership or executive team
- Write an op-ed or blog post
- Engage social media
- Propose child care as a topic of discussion at chamber of commerce or economic development meetings
- Advocate for public policy changes
- Invest philanthropic dollars to support early care and learning programs
