- 1. Find your voice
- 2. Establish presence

Tips for navigating virtual and blended teaching

- Recognize how classroom and virtual teaching inform each other
- Connect the real classroom with the virtual space/ Connect virtual learning to real life
- Determine the optimal mix of asynchronous and synchronous
- Use a variety of group, individual, self-paced, and offscreen activities
- Provide daily prompts for family interactions and a family activity they can do together offline

Tips from the Neighborhood: What Fred Rogers can teach us about hybrid and virtual learning


- Teaching and learning are never remote

 Relationships matter most
- Bring your **whole self** to teaching
- Slow down, use a calm, reassuring tone and a gentle pace
- Keep routines consistent and predictable



Tips from the Neighborhood: What Fred Rogers can teach us about hybrid and virtual learning

- Talk to one child at a time and to all the children at once
- Give children time to **notice**, be **curious**, and **wonder**
- Model it is OK to make mistakes and how hard it is to learn something new
- Let them "catch your enthusiasm"



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
